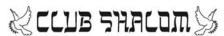

COVID RULES UPDATE

Effective Wednesday, February 16, the Society's Covid rules were updated as follows:

- Masks are strongly recommended but are optional for residents and their guests in all Society buildings.
- Food may be served and consumed in Society buildings.
- Masks and proof of vaccination are required for all Society employees and all non-resident instructors in all Society buildings.
- The capacity limit in the Heritage Room remains at 90.
- The capacity limit in the Wood Shop is increased to 9.
- Individual clubs/groups may require masks and/or proof of vaccination to attend their respective events. If so, they are responsible for checking attendees' proof of vaccination.
- Mask are required on shuttle buses.

The rules are subject to change depending on circumstances.

ONE ALTERNATIVE TO NYSEG

Westchester Power (also known as Sustainable Westchester) is a non-profit program that provides residents an alternative to environmentally harmful fossil fuel sources. They recently hosted a ZOOM presentation during which its representatives discussed a program in which 23 Westchester communities are currently participating; Somers is one of these communities. Westchester Power is not an Energy Services Company (ESCO), which are for profit.

I participated in the ZOOM presentation, and following is my recap:

- The program begins on March 1, 2022, and continues until November 30, 2023, at which time it should automatically renew, although it didn't automatically renew when the prior period expired last year.
- The 100% renewable energy charge is \$.1017 per kWh, the standard charge is \$.8736 per kWh; these charges are for electricity supply only. During the upcoming period, Westchester Power will get their electricity from Constellation New Energy.
- There is no day/night rate, the rate is the same 24/7. The meters will be read as usual by NYSEG. (If you receive estimated charges during some months of the year and prefer to have an actual monthly reading, you can arrange to send NYSEG a picture of your meter reading or email or phone in the meter reading.)
- NYSEG will still deliver your electricity at whatever the prevailing delivery rate is, and will also maintain wires, etc.
- Your monthly NYSEG bill will include the Westchester Power charges, and any credits from participating in the Community Solar program (see below).
- Keep in mind that at any time the cost of natural gas can go down, and your NYSEG charges for electricity would likely also be reduced; the Westchester Power charge for renewable and standard will remain the same for the next 21 months (March 2022 through Nov 2023) regardless of market fluctuations, up or down.
- You can also consider joining Community Solar, which gives you a small credit on your entire bill (from 1% to as much as 10%). There is no charge to opt in to the Community Solar program, and it can be added on to either the standard or renewable energy option of the Westchester Power program.
- You can opt out of these program at any time.

The Council's Zoom meeting held on Wednesday, January 19, at 7 pm focused on how we could counteract the proposed Somers National Golf Club's petition to the Somers Town Board and the Somers Planning Board of adding a Mini Golf Course, Cigar Bar, and Golf Simulator Center on their property in Heritage Hills.

Condo Presidents and/or their representatives in attendance agreed to have petitions or letters sent to the members of the Somers Town Board and the Planning Board objecting to this plan. The Heritage Hills Society Board attorney will review the documents before distribution to the Condo Presidents. The Council of Condominiums is coordinating the petition/letter writing campaign.

A member of the Somers Planning Board in attendance at the meeting suggested the Council wait until the Somers Town Building Department Director reviews the official 1970s DRD (Design Residential Development) which outlines the buildout of our beautiful community and the Golf Course. The Planning Board will meet on Wednesday, February 9, and we may have answers at that time.

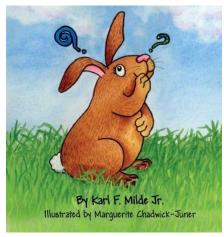

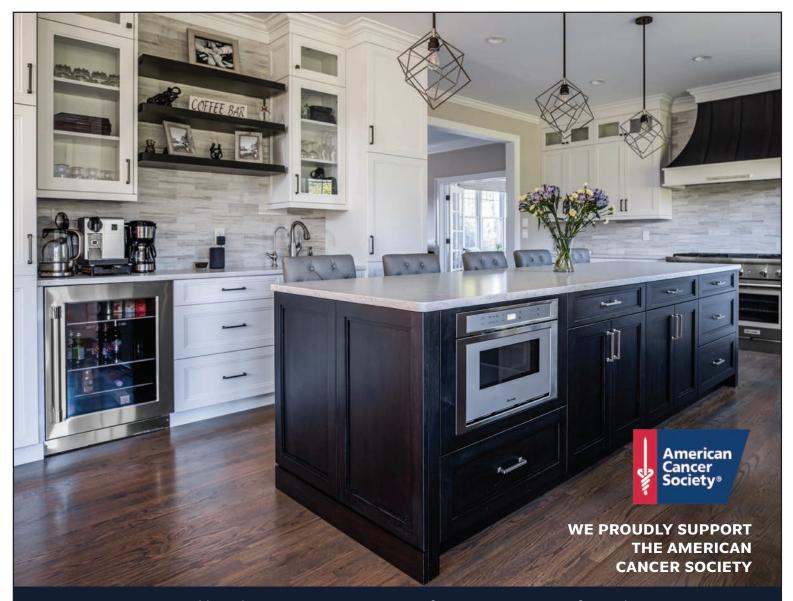
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DUPLICATE BRIDGE CLUB SILVER LIFE MASTER

BAGELS, THE BREAD WITH A HOLE IN THE MIDDLE

Bagels have become a staple in American households.

As I child in Youngstown, Ohio, I ate bagels. Inside the circular, crisp, brown crust was a cake-like bread. These bagels were sliced sideways and filled for Sunday supper with salami and corned beef. Imagine my shock on moving to New York and buying a bagel here. Inside the crust was a dense, doughy, chewy bread. "This is a real bagel," I was told.

It is generally believed that bagels originated in Poland in the 1600s. Traditionally they were shaped by hand into the form of a ring and made from yeasted wheat dough. Approximately hand sized, they were first boiled in water for a short time before being baked. They are the only bread boiled before baking. Vendors used the bread's hole to thread the bread onto poles and hawk them on street corners. Bagels were often given as gifts to women in labor. In the 1800s immigrant Polish Jews brought this bread to the United States. By the 1960s they were being sold nationwide.

There seems to be no end to the type of bagel one can purchase. In addition to the traditional plain, sesame, and poppy seed bagels there are cinnamon raisin bagels, onion bagels, pumpernickel bagels, pretzel bagels, iced bagels, toasted garlic bagels, and the "everything" bagel, to name some choices. Bagel bakeries offer their own selection.

A bagel's taste varies slightly from one area to another because our States receive water from different sources. New Yorkers' bagel bakers tout New York bagels claiming our water contains the perfect ratio of calcium to magnesium.

Montrealers favor the "Montreal Bagel" which is quite different from the "New York" bagel. It is smaller and thinner with a larger hole. While New York bagels are made using salt and malt, Montreal bagels are boiled in water that contains honey and sugar. Friends living in Montreal claim, "We don't need fancy flavors or toppings. Our bagels taste good on their own."

Wonderful when fresh, bagels can quickly turn tough and leathery. Microwaving makes them tough. Left over bagels are best stored in a tightly sealed plastic bag with all the air sucked out. Don't refrigerate. Bagels should be kept on the counter in a cool place.

Inviting friends over for a bagel breakfast, brunch, or lunch is a quick and easy way to entertain. One can offer several types of bagels, cream cheese, butter, lox, capers, tomatoes and onions. I also put out a fruit salad and sometimes tuna or chicken salad. Although a few of my friends scoop out the inside of their bagels to save calories, most bagels have a calorie count of only 71.

Nowadays bagels are mass produced and sold packaged in supermarkets as well as convenience stores. We must decide for ourselves what is the real bagel.

THE FORMER CANINE COMPANIONS CLUB

"The Dogs of Heritage Hills," an article which appeared in the December Newsletter, elicited a lot of comments, including several from dog owners who wished we had included photos of their dogs. The end of the article noted that, "as of now, there is no Activity or Affinity Group in Heritage Hills devoted to the care and keeping, not to mention the companionship and enjoyment, of dogs."

Well not too long ago, there *was* one. It was called "Canine Companions" and back in 2014 it had ninety-nine members. But I'm getting ahead of myself. Here's the story:

The year was 2010 and Heritage Hills resident Patricia Adams, a jazz musician and journalist for the *Westchester County Press*, took home a Cocker Spaniel rescue from the ASPCA shelter in Manhattan. She named her dog "Taffeta Elizabeth Anne," or "Taffy" for short.

Soon after adopting Taffy, Patricia realized there was no place in the area for Taffy to run free and play



with other dogs. Speaking with the dog owners she met while on her daily walks with Taffy, a core group quickly coalesced around the idea to create a fenced-in "dog park" somewhere in Somers - a place where they could let their dogs go, free of a leash, to socialize with other dogs and to gain some much-needed exercise.

The group quickly learned what was required to form an officially-sanctioned club at Heritage Hills at that time — they needed to enroll at least fifty members, create a set of bylaws, and elect a president, vice president, treasurer, and secretary. To accomplish this, they announced an initial meeting of all interested Heritage Hills residents and, to their surprise, the conference room at the Somers Library overflowed. After choosing the name, "Canine Companions," and electing officers, the new club was off and running.

To make a long and very interesting story short, Canine Companions Club submitted a petition to the Somers Town Council to create a dog park. Club members obtained over five hundred Somers residents' signatures to support the petition and, once it was approved, they worked hard to make the park a reality. The Town of Somers donated a plot of land on Route 100, and the club held both a tag sale at St. Luke's and a "Swingin' Soiree" jazz concert at Lake Lodge to obtain necessary funds. In the end they raised an amazing \$19,277 to contribute toward the "Somers Dog Park" which opened in 2013.

Their initial objective – the Somers dog park – achieved, the Canine Companions Club turned inward to Heritage Hills. As discussed above, they had obtained club certification by the Society, so they met once a month in the Activities Center to exchange information on dog diet and grooming, and hear local veterinarians speak about



dog regulations and licensing.

Most importantly, the Club members found friends of like interest who knew the joys of dog ownership.

The Canine Companions Club eventually disbanded in 2018, although it is fondly remembered by many dog owners.

HEALTH & SAFETY COMMITTEE AMERICAN HEART HEALTH

Appearing in the April 2019 issue of this Newsletter was a spoof called, "The Secret Garden Railway of Heritage Hills." It described a model train that ran secretly though a garden behind one of the Condo units here. Now that the secret is finally revealed (sorry folks, there was no such railway!), I can tell you another secret: a garden railway will be coming to Heritage Hills. There *will* be no announcement, so you'll have to look for it; and it may appear for a short time and then disappear, only to reappear at another time and maybe at another place. But it will be *real* this time. Here's a hint: No Condo permission will be required. Another hint: One of the model locomotives is described elsewhere in this Newsletter. It will partner with a second, more up-to-date, locomotive to lug freight cars around the garden track layout.

You may think that model trains are for children alone, but I suggest you think again. The Christmas Train Shows at the New York Botanical Garden and the Lasdon Park Arboretum have been huge hits with children of all ages. The G-gauge tracks the trains here will run on are sized to create a "garden railway" for a reason. The trains are designed to run *outside* in a garden. The garden may contain some model buildings – a railroad station, for example - but, above all, the garden will have live plants: small trees and shrubs perhaps, to set the scene in miniature, and most assuredly *flowers*. A flower garden with trains! What could be nicer?

Operating a model railway can be even more fascinating than watching it. You can play both engineer and route dispatcher, setting track

LEGO CELEBRATES THE SWISS CROCODILE LOCOMOTIVE

The Gotthard Pass through the Swiss Alps is the principal route between northern Europe and Italy. When the nine-mile Gotthard Railway Tunnel under the Pass opened in 1882, it was the longest tunnel in the world. A succession of further tunnels followed, culminating in 2016 with the thirty-five mile "Gotthard Base Tunnel," which is now the world's longest tunnel.

The original tunnel, a miraculous technical achievement though it was, posed a significant problem at the outset. Steam engines, prime movers the at the time, created smoke, soot, and cinders that could not be completely ventilated. It took forty years, but Swiss engineers eventually developed an electric locomotive strong enough to take the place of the steam version.



This distinctive looking locomotive, called the "Crocodile" because of its long "snouts" at both ends, comprised three sections which articulated to allow the machine to negotiate the tight curves through the mountains.

With the electrification of the Gotthard Railway Tunnel in 1920, Crocodiles quickly replaced all the steam engines on this route. They were eventually assigned to haul freight all over Switzerland. Many were renovated to increase their speed, and they remained in operation for fifty years, until 1976 when all, except one, were retired.

This one legendary locomotive, No. 14253, was completely refurbished and then donated to the Swiss Railway Historical Society or "SBB Historic." On August 2, 2019, SBB Historic feted the engine's 100th birthday at the north portal of the Gotthard Base Tunnel.

This celebratory event did not go unnoticed by the folks at LEGO. In 2020 LEGO added an 18-inch Crocodile locomotive replica (1271 pieces) to its "Creator Expert" line of LEGO sets. A special 20-inch section of track was included in the set for display purposes, but the



locomotive could also be operated remotely on regular LEGO track, using a free smartphone app.

Intrigued by the historic significance of the Crocodile and always up for a challenge, I bought the LEGO set and began building the engine. The step-by-step instructions were amazingly easy to follow and not a single piece was missing.

In case you're interested in buying and building one too, you'd better hurry because LEGO discontinued making them on December 31, 2021. Like the historic Swiss locomotive itself, the LEGO Crocodile will soon be history.







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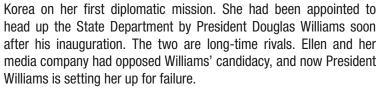

Bill Clinton had teamed up with James Patterson to write two blockbuster novels, *The President Is Missing* and *The President's Daughter*. Not to be outdone, Hillary Rodham Clinton co-authored her own espionage thriller, *State of Terror*, with mystery writer Louise Penny last fall.

State of Terror begins with Secretary of State Ellen Adams returning from South

Aside from Betsy Jameson, her best friend and State Department counselor, Ellen is mistrustful of the new administration's staff members. Ellen, however, must spring into action quickly when an international calamity arises. In rapid succession, bombs go off in three European cities. Bashir Shah, a devious Pakistani arms dealer, is thought to be the mastermind behind the terrorist plot.

As the global crisis intensifies, Ellen consolidates support with international allies to stop Bashir Shah before he strikes again. Her daughter Katherine, now head of their family's media company, goes on a secret mission to the Middle East, while her son Gil, an investigative reporter with a questionable past, gets caught up in the fray. Amid it all, there appears to be a mole in the White House, and everyone is a deemed a suspect.

A disclaimer on *State of Terror*'s copyright page declares: "This is a work of fiction. All of the characters and events portrayed in this novel are fictional." Nevertheless, some characters, particularly one-term former President Eric Dunn, are thinly disguised. In one absorbing scene, Ellen flies to Florida to interview Dunn about his relationship with Bashir Shah. Arriving at Dunn's ostentatious mansion, Ellen muses that it "would have been splendid had it been an actual palace and not a monument to overcompensation. She'd had her media outlets do profiles on Dunn as his empire had grown, then crumbed, then rose again. Each time more audacious. More bloated. More fragile."

Back at the Capitol, Ellen devises a clever plan to expose the traitor within President Williams' administration. With its twists and turns, *State of Terror* is a plot-driven novel. Secretary Clinton's debut novel, indeed, will appeal to readers who are fascinated with political intrigue.

HOW DOES YOUR GARDEN GROW? ABOUT MARIGOLDS

When I was a kid, I saw my mother plant marigolds in her vegetable garden. No other flowers – just marigolds – so I asked her why. To this day I remember her saying, "They keep the bugs away." I didn't doubt for a minute that what she said was true (at that age

I believed whatever my mother told me) but do remember wondering how those marigolds could do that.

Last spring my wife, Cheryl, and I planted a single row of marigolds in my community garden square, not to keep the bugs away, but because their colors were pretty and they were, well... inexpensive.



As the summer went on, I received an extra benefit from doing so: The marigolds multiplied and expanded to fill in the area, making them eye candy when you walked past the garden. They popped!



These are just a few of the benefits of choosing these yellow, orange, and gold-colored flowers. Another is their ability to bloom brightly all summer and into the fall if you snip off the blossoms when they fade.

Marigolds have carnation-like flowerheads produced singly or in clusters. Although there are some fifty species of marigolds, you'll normally see one of the following:

American marigolds (Tagetes erecta): These are the tallest of marigolds, reaching about two feet in height and producing large flowers. They thrive even under drought conditions.

French marigolds (Tagetes patula): French marigolds are smaller and bushier than the American – usually growing only up to a foot tall. They tolerate wet conditions better than the other species.

Signet marigolds (Tagetes tenuifolia): These petite marigolds do well in hot, dry places and make a nice edging plant.

English marigolds (Calendula officinalis): This plant is actually not a true marigold. Its bright flowers are edible, having a tangy, peppery taste, so it is often grown as an herb in kitchen gardens.

The American and French marigolds are generally aromatic, hence that folklore that the bugs don't like them and stay away.

Young French and Signet marigolds can be planted from late spring through midsummer, but the taller American marigolds should be planted as early as possible because they are slower to mature.

All marigolds usually sprout within a week in warm weather and typically produce blooms within about eight weeks. They thrive in full sunshine and can often withstand very hot, dry weather. They do best in moderately fertile, well-drained soil.

So if you're considering what annual flowers to plant this year, add marigolds to the mix. They're eye-catching and they're easy-peasy to care for.





MUSHROOM BOURGUIGNON

Many of us are eating a more plant-based diet today, and with this in mind, here is a lovely dish, inspired by the classic French dish of Beef Bourguignon, served over wide noodles. This dish tastes like a very rich, savory stew, especially if made with the mushroom broth.

INGREDIENTS

- 2 tbsp. olive oil
- 2 pounds mixed mushrooms such as cremini, shitake trimmed, quartered or sliced thickly
- 3 tbsp. unsalted butter
- 3 medium carrots, cut on the bias, in about 3/4-inch thick slices
- 2 medium parsnips, cut on the bias, about 1/2-inch thick slices
- 1 large onion, thinly sliced

- 3 tbsp. tomato paste
- 2 tsp. thyme leaves, fresh if possible
- 2 cloves garlic, minced

Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper

- 1 cup dry red wine
- 2 cups vegetable or mushroom broth
- 3 bay leaves
- 2 tbsp. flour

Wide egg noodles

Chopped fresh parsley

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Heat 1 tbsp. of the olive oil in a large pot or Dutch Oven over medium high heat. Once the oil is very hot and shimmering, add half the mushrooms in an even layer and cook, undisturbed until the undersides are well browned, 3 to 4 minutes. Stir the mushrooms and continue to cook until just tender, about 3 minutes more. Remove with a slotted spoon to a plate. Add the remaining 1 tbsp. olive oil and remaining mushrooms. Repeat the same method of browning the mushrooms and remove to the same plate.
- 2. Melt 2 tbsp. of butter in the same pot, then add the carrots, parsnips, and onion. Cook, stirring occasionally, until the onions are translucent, and the parsnips start to brown in spots, about 6 minutes. Stir in the tomato paste, thyme, garlic, 1 tsp. of salt, and several grinds of black pepper. Cook until the garlic is tender and the tomato paste turns brick red, about 2 minutes more. Stir in the wine, then simmer until reduced by half, 2 to 3 minutes.
- 3. Return the mushrooms to the pot and stir in the broth, bay leaves, a good pinch of salt, and a couple of grinds of black pepper. Bring to a boil, then reduce the heat to medium low and simmer uncovered until the mushrooms are very tender and the sauce has reduced slightly, 20 to 25 minutes.
- 4. Meanwhile, stir together the flour and remaining 1 tbsp. butter in a small bowl until a thick paste forms. Stir the flour mixture into the sauce until completely absorbed, then continue to simmer until the sauce has thickened to a gravy-like consistency, about 10 minutes. Discard the bay leaves, taste and adjust the seasoning with more salt and pepper. Serve over cooked wide egg noodles with a sprinkle of chopped parsley.

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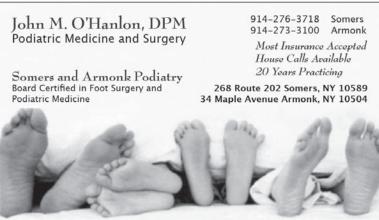

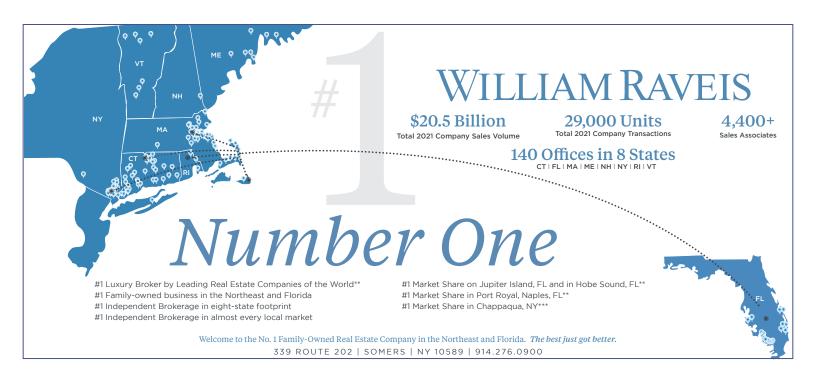
