#### SAMUEL UNTERMYER: FORGOTTEN HERO

Lecture by Stephen Byrns,

Founder and President of Untermyer Gardens Conservancy

The *public* Samuel Untermyer (1858–1940) was a member of New York's German-Jewish elite. A brilliant lawyer and investor, he was an outspoken advocate for some of the major causes of the 20th century:

Trustbuster and economic reformer, he was the lead architect of the Federal Reserve Act; An ardent "Suffragent," he was an



indefatigable campaigner for women's right to vote; His was a voice for the people; he successfully argued to save the nickel subway fare; As early as the mid-1920s, he led the avant-garde fight against Nazism and warned the world about Hitler.

The *private* Untermyer, on the other hand, had a very different but no less passionate dream: to create the finest garden in the world on his 150-acre estate on the Hudson River in Yonkers. This lecture will conclude with the garden's evolution – from its heyday in the 1920s, to its descent into ruin in the 60s and 70s, and to its spectacular restoration today.

#### REOPENING COMMITTEE - GLORIA ANDERSON, CHAIR

Two days ago, it was reported there were 128 active cases in Somers, and there were 24 new cases between July 23 and 24. Based on that, our current protocol will stand unchanged – 90 person maximum in the Heritage Room and masks recommended indoors.

- Benches: A resident has suggested additional benches, which is under consideration.
- Park Place: The awning has been installed.

#### LANDSCAPE COMMITTEE - PATRICIA PLOSS, CHAIR

We hope to make improvements to the parking medians at Pools 4 and 5 this Fall.

#### **COMMUNITY AFFAIRS COMMITTEE - JACK MATTES, CHAIR**

- Red Cross Smoke Alarms: The volunteers do eight to ten installations a day. Call the Activities Office for information.
- Town Meeting Viewing: In July, Comcast notified the town it had changed the viewing channel from 22 to 1072 seven months ago.
- **Voting**: Absentee ballots for the November general election must be received by November 23. Homebound individuals can go to *Westchestergov.com*, then Board of Elections for an Absentee Ballot Application. If you have problems, contact Andrew at the Activities Office, and he will put me in touch with you.

- Cell Towers: The Planning Board has announced they will be revamped.
- **Somers National Golf**: Will remove from its property all debris not natural to the environment. Tree planting may take place.

- Emergencies: In the past month, two medical emergencies were expeditiously attended to.
- Pool Toys: Are now allowed at Pool 1 as well as Pool 3.

- Wellness Fair: Originally scheduled to take place on September 17, has been postponed to next year. Instead, there will be presentations on that date. [See page 5.]

#### SECURITY REPORT - DAVE JACOBSEN, PROSEGUR SECURITY

Our Security staff cannot pull vehicles over or issue tickets. Only official law enforcement officers can do that.

#### OPERATIONS REPORT - JOHN MILLIGAN, PROPERTY MANAGER

- **Tennis**: The platform tennis courts will be resurfaced, and a fiberglass practice court has been installed at Court 5.
- Pickleball Court: The surface will be repainted for free.
- Activities Center Parking Lot: The 160-foot underground drainage pipe had to be replaced.
- Storm Water Retention Basin Maintenance: All water runoff from Heritage Hills drains into two D.E.C. streams — Plum Brook and East Brown Brook — which discharge into D.E.P. reservoirs, so regular maintenance is required.
- Meadowlark Park Horseshoe Pits: A walkway leading to them will be installed.

#### **COUNCIL OF CONDOS**

**In Attendance at the July meeting**: Condos 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, 8, 11, 12, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 23, 24, 26, 27, 28, and 30

Electrical Grounding & Bonding Wires: The Council distributed Somers Building Inspector specifications for the Electrical Grounding for Condos. The specifications are for use by electrical engineers. The Council is negotiating with the Town on how permits should be determined for this project and the timeline for completion. Permits should be applied per building rather than individual units. Therefore, upon completion of the project the Condo would receive a Certificate of Compliance that reads, "Condo 20, Bldg. 204, Units A, B, C". Condos need time to budget for this project. Therefore, it may take several years to complete.

Rebuilding a Unit after a Fire—Five Months: Unit 973 B, which experienced the tragic fire in February, is in Condo 19. The fire occurred in a two-unit building. Unit A sold a week before the fire; therefore, it was empty. The only damage to Unit A occurred by the Fire Department, checking for fire within the unit through the roof, ceiling, and minimum wall damage. The fire wall built between the two units prevented the fire from entering Unit A. Unit B is a total

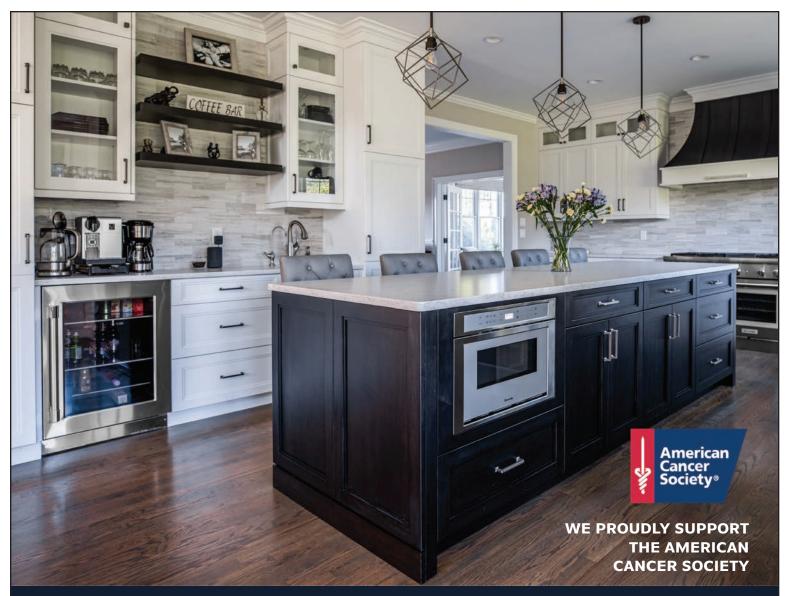

loss. The rear of Unit B which included the outside wall, kitchen, dining room, and living room was destroyed, and flames charred a 150-foot tall tree off the patio. The Fire Department arrived at 4 pm and left the scene around 11 that evening. The following day the property manager had water and electric turned off to both units and the scene was fenced and secured. Fire and Building Department inspectors worked with the property manager to find the cause, which was deemed "undetermined." Debris was removed after inspections were completed by the Condo and unit owners' insurance companies. The property manager hired an architect and general contractor to work with two Condo 19 Board members to get the job started. Within six weeks Greater NY paid most of the claim so work could begin. The rebuilding of Unit B will meet current building codes, and electric ceiling heat will be replaced by heat pumps. Repairs to Unit A have been completed. Materials for the rebuild of Unit B have been ordered with work due to start in August. The slab will be replaced to meet New York State building codes. We hope to have it completed by the end of this year. Both owners continue to pay their monthly maintenance fees. Jason Schiciano of Levitt-Fiurst was very helpful.

**Electrical Box Update**: Many residents complained of unsightly metal electrical utility boxes outside their doors and within their Condo's property. Most Condos responded to three emails sent as a reminder over the past two months. The project is now in the hands of Society to contact the utility companies responsible to remedy these unsightly metal boxes. Thank you to the 25 Condos that responded to the request for information.

**Comcast Firewall Repair**: Most Condos participated in a franchise agreement and a ten-year contract with Comcast in 2016 which allowed those Condos to be rewired. The rewiring within attached buildings went through the connecting firewall for those buildings. Those connections need to be repaired to reinforce the efficacy of the firewall. Comcast has been contacted to alleviate the issue.

**Council Directory**: The "2022-2023 Contractor and Suppliers Directory" has been completed and Condos were advised to pick up the Directories from the Activities Office for disbursement to Heritage Hills residents.

**Errant Golf Balls**: It seems that since Somers Point Golf Course has changed from a private club to a public course, many golfers are inexperienced and Condos are finding an abundance of golf balls hitting windows, in gardens, and in general being a hazard. If your Condo is experiencing these issues, contact the president of Condo 20.

**Golf Club Cigar Bar**: A proposal to plant trees and shrubbery at the property line was made by a Condo 15 unit owner at the July Somers Planning Board meeting to prevent smoke and noise from the proposed Cigar Bar.

All Condo Presidents or their representative are invited to attend the Council of Condos meeting on September 21 at 7 pm in the Activities Center.

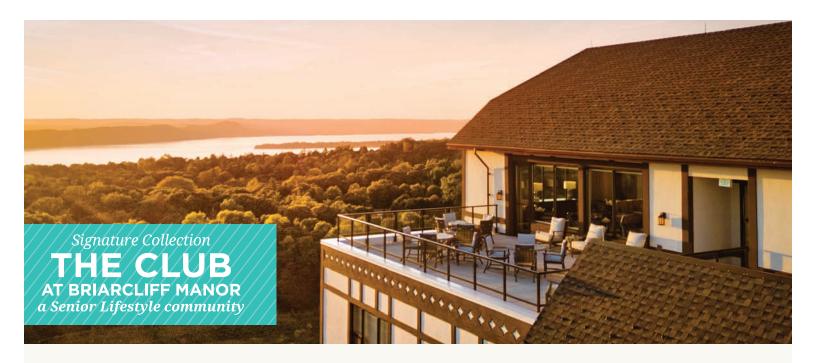

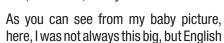

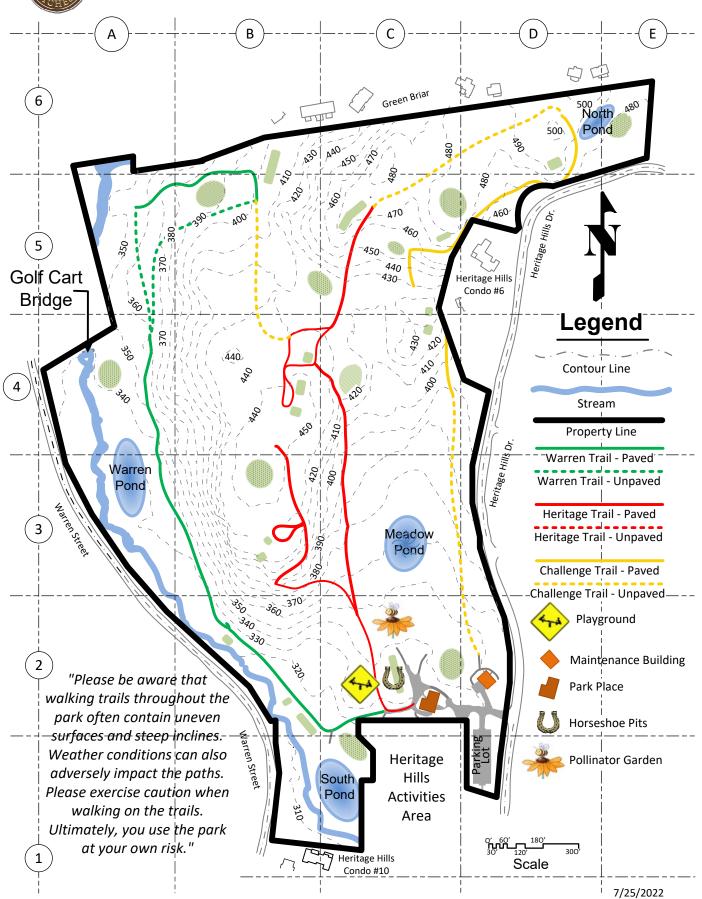

RAINA was raised in a musical family. Her mother was a Julliard graduate and accomplished pianist. While growing up, Raina took piano and cello lessons. As a teenager she attended the High School of Music and Art. "There I was immersed in

## DOES YOUR HOT WATER HEATER NEED REPLACING?

A good friend of mine, a resident here in Heritage Hills whom I'll call "Joe," had a hot water heater that burst. It didn't just leak. It actually burst and all the hot water in the tank spilled out at once. When that happened, the



cold-water supply line kept flowing, trying to fill the empty tank, until Joe came home and closed the water inlet valve.

But the damage was done. Water had soaked the floorboards, swelling them, and had even damaged the supporting joists below. Joe and his wife had to move into a hotel for two weeks while their contractor tore out and replaced all the damaged woodwork. Total cost, including replacing damaged furniture: \$42,000 which, thankfully, was covered by insurance. Joe asked that I share his experience with readers of this Newsletter.

The hot water heaters in our units hum quietly, working away day and night, and the hot water just keeps flowing. We tend to forget about them until...

I rushed home after hearing Joe's story and opened a panel in the back of a clothes closet to access my own hot water heater, which I hadn't looked at since my wife and I moved here four years ago. Near the top of the tank, in bold black ink, were the numbers "6-20-2010." My tank was installed over twelve years ago.

There are two types of water heaters: gas and electric. Gas water heaters are more economical because of the lower cost of natural gas, but they don't last quite as long as electric water heaters. It is recommended that a gas water heater be replaced six to eight years after installation. For electric hot water heaters, as mine was, should be replaced between eight and ten years from installation. Although most heaters last somewhat longer, as did mine, the longer you wait the greater the risk of that dreaded leak, or worse.

If you can't find the installation date of your hot water heater, you can find out the date of its manufacture by finding the three alphanumeric characters preceding the serial number: a letter representing the month (the sixth letter of the alphabet, F, for June) and two numbers representing the year (11 for 2011). So, F11 means June 2011.

You should replace your hot water heater right away if either the tank or your hot water shows signs of rust or if you hear rumbling noises as the water heats up. If the water is not sufficiently hot, the problem may be a broken heating element which can be replaced without replacing the entire tank. Only a licensed plumber can diagnose the problem and tell you how much he or she will charge to fix it.

So, if you have no idea when your hot water heater was installed, please check it now! It just might be getting ready to blow.

## SEPTEMBER IS PROSTATE CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

#### What is a PSA test?

The PSA test is a blood test used primarily to screen for prostate cancer. The test measures the amount of prostate-specific antigen (PSA) in your blood. PSA is a protein produced by both cancerous and noncancerous tissue in the prostate gland, a small gland that sits below the bladder in males.

#### Should I have a PSA test?

Yes. Prostate cancer is the most common form of cancer in men, besides skin cancer, and 40 percent of cases hit men before age 65.

#### Are certain men more susceptible to prostate cancer?

Yes. Black men have double the risk of dying from prostate cancer and tend to get it at a younger age. Having a father or brother with prostate cancer also doubles your risk.

#### Should I be frightened if my PSA is elevated?

No. Most men with elevated PSA don't have cancer, and only 25 percent of biopsies find cancer.

#### Is there any good news?

Yes. Nearly 99 per cent of prostate cancer cases are treatable if they are caught early.

So, have your test if your doctor recommends it and know that you are doing all you can to stay healthy.

#### FORWARD HEAD POSTURE

Do you suffer from neck pain, headaches, upper back pain, or pain in vour arm?

If so, it could have to do with FHP or Forward Head Posture. By age 35, more than six out of ten people will be diagnosed with this condition, and it is increasingly affecting our teenage population. Due to the explosive growth of smartphones, laptops, and tablets, the number of people suffering from FHP has dramatically increased. Users hunch over for hours without a break.

When you hunch, the load on your neck increases: instead of just supporting the weight of your head, which weighs 10 to 12 pounds. your neck has to deal with 40 to 60 pounds. Unfortunately, when looking down at your phone, your neck tilts forward 40 to 60 degrees and that is the equivalent of a three-year-old child sitting on your neck each time you text, etc. on your smartphone.

Some tips to improve neck posture:

- 1. Look in the mirror, analyze your posture, and try to correct it.
- 2. When looking at your phone, keep your head in the neutral position - bring the phone to your face, not the other way around.
- 3. Adjust your computer screen to be directly in front of you, at or slightly below eye level. Even keeping your head turned ten degrees for a short period to look at a screen will affect your neck.

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- 4. Every 50 minutes, stand up and stretch your neck.
- 5. Do simple neck exercises every day.

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- 6. Make sure your sleep pillow is your friend supporting your head and neck properly - and not your enemy.
- 7. Utilize good nutrition for proper muscle and nerve activity.

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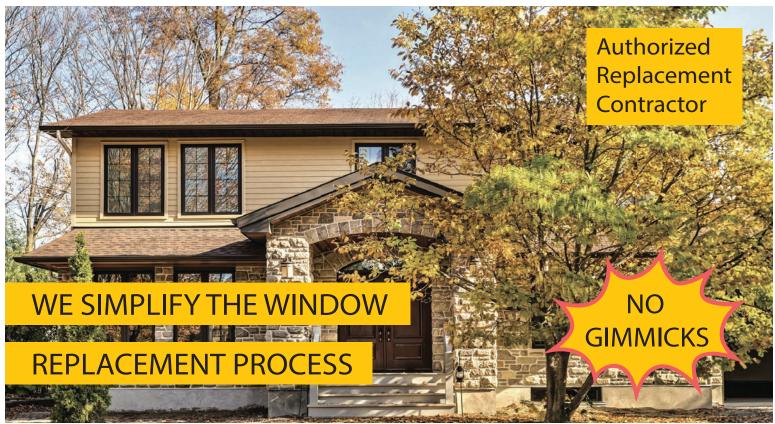

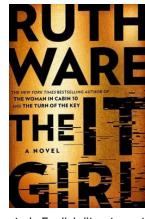

Scotland. Hannah had won a scholarship to study English literature at Oxford with the hopes of becoming a professor. However, she left the university without obtaining a degree after her roommate April Clarke-Cliveden was tragically killed. The conviction of John Neville, a porter in the girls' dorm, was largely based on Hannah's testimony at his trial.

As first-year Oxford students, Hannah had been assigned to share a dorm suite with April. Hannah was from a working-class family, while April was wealthy, confident, and glamorous: "She had the kind of beauty that hurt your eyes if you looked at her too long, but made it hard to tear your gaze away...as if a different kind of light were shining on her."

With her magnetic charm, April quickly drew a group of close friends into their circle including handsome, affluent Will de Chastaigne and his socially awkward pal Hugh Bland, who was studying medicine. Rounding out their clique was left-leaning Ryan Coates and quickwitted Emily Lippman, aiming for a career in mathematics.

Beneath April's charisma, however, was a mischievous side. The beautiful flirt often played practical jokes on her friends, much to their displeasure. April's hold on the group was so powerful, nevertheless, that her pranks were often forgiven. Hannah, the one friend April never targeted, was fiercely protective of her roommate, and she was devastated by April's murder.

Ten years later, Hannah is content with her quiet life in Scotland. But her calm world is upended when she's informed that John Neville has suddenly died in prison, putting "It Girl Murder" in the news again. Neville apparently had maintained his innocence to the end, and his lawyer was looking into new evidence. A reporter delving into the case tracks Hannah down, forcing her to confront her past friendships and to question the testimony she had given at Neville's trial.

In the mode of Agatha Christie, Ruth Ware scatters clever clues throughout *The It Girl*. For arm-chair sleuths, *The It Girl* indeed is a cool diversion on a hot, late summer day.

## IT'S TIME TO ORDER DAFFODIL BULBS, AND TULIP BULBS, TOO!

Here's a gentle reminder for those of you who plan ahead (you know who you are!): It's time to order or pick up your daffodil bulbs for planting in October.

Imagine Spring. Now imagine spring without forsythia and, yes, without the daffodils. You can't!

You can never plant too many daffodils. Get your bulbs, plant them in the ground, and enjoy the flowers in the spring. There are quite a few varieties, so you'll have to choose. You can plant them in a new area or add daffodils to areas you've previously planted. You can even add tulips, but we'll get to that shortly. Just know that the possibilities are endless.

Here's a simple tutorial for planting your daffodils:

- 1. Go online, select a grower, and look at the beautiful daffodils they have to offer;
- 2. Select the variety(ies) of daffodils you like best and order the bulbs, or look for them at garden centers starting this month;
- 3. When the bulbs arrive, place them in a paper bag or box, and store them in a cool dark place (a closet or your garage would be a good spot):
- 4. Come late October, when the daytime temperature has dropped below 60 degrees (they need to be cool to hibernate for the winter) plant the bulbs 4" to 6" apart (they don't like to be crowded) with their pointy stems aimed upward, sufficiently deep so that these stems are covered with about 2" of soil;
- 5. Soak the soil with water;
- 6. Cover the soil with a layer of mulch so it will retain moisture longer;
- 7. Water again twice: one week later and two weeks later; and
- 8. Having put them to bed, leave your bulbs alone to sleep through the winter.

In the spring your bulbs will awaken. You'll see green shoots poke up above the surface. The spring rains should provide the necessary water, but if it doesn't rain for a couple of weeks, act as their Rain God and soak them once or twice. Soon after, the green shoots will mature into beautiful daffodils. What a wonder of Mother Nature!

If you are a fan of tulips (as I am), you can follow the same eight steps to plant tulip bulbs. But be forewarned: Unlike daffodils, which deer absolutely avoid due to a toxin they contain, they love the taste of tulips. So, you will need to spray them every other day with a deer repellant.

That's all there is to it! So, like the title of this article says, it's time to order the daffodils. And tulips too!

### THE PROBLEM WITH HOLDING ONTO THE HANDRAILS ON THE TREADMILL

When you hold onto the treadmill handrails, it:

- Ruins your posture if your arms are forward, which rounds your back.
- 2. Creates an uneven body alignment.
- 3. Does not help you build balance actually does the opposite.
- 4. Reduces the number of calories burned.
- 5. Reduces the effects of any incline you are using.,
- 6. Is not good for the treadmill itself because it creates a drag.

If you are uncertain and need to hold on in the beginning for safety reasons, then do so, but if you are walking at an incline at a good clip and are holding on, doing so actually holding you back!

Some tips to think about:

- Go at a slower speed and adjust your posture shoulders bac, chest lifted – and think about keeping your core muscles tight.
- Focus on your posture.
- Focus on your balance.
- Try not to support your body weight with your arms.
- Always use the safety clip.
- Any time you feel unstable, grab the handles with a light touch.

Thinking about these tips while on the treadmill will help you to develop better balance, posture, and ability!

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#### **SPICY CITRUS SKIRT STEAK**

Time: 30 minutes plus grill heating

Yield: 4 servings

#### **INGREDIENTS**

1 1/2 pounds skirt steak

8 tangerines, satsumas, or mandarin oranges, washed and halved horizontally.

6 tablespoons unseasoned rice wine vinegar

6 tablespoons low sodium soy sauce

1 tablespoon sambal oelek or Sriracha, plus more as needed

1 1-inch piece of ginger, peeled and finely grated (about 1 tablespoon)

1 garlic clove, finely grated

Kosher salt and black pepper

Neutral oil, such as grapeseed

#### **PREPARATION**

- 1. Heat a grill to high. While the grill is heating, pat the steak dry and cut, with the grain, into 5- to 6-inch pieces. Set it aside on a sheet pan to air-dry while you make the sauce: Squeeze 1 cup of juice from the tangerines into a bowl or dish large enough to hold the steak after it's grilled. Put the remaining tangerine halves on a sheet pan. Add the spent tangerine halves to the juice and smash the halves with a spoon to release the rinds' oils. Add the rice vinegar, soy sauce, sambal oelek, ginger, and garlic and season with salt and pepper, then stir to combine.
- 2. When the grill is ready, add the steak to the sheet pan with tangerine halves and lightly coat everything with neutral oil and season generously with salt. Oil the cleaned grill grates. Grill the steak and tangerine halves over direct heat flipping halfway through until well browned 2 to 3 minutes per side,
- 3. As the steak and tangerine halves finish cooking, add them to the sauce and turn to coat. Squeeze the charred tangerine halves to release the juice into the dish. Let rest at least 5 and up to 30 minutes. Slice the steak against the grain and serve with the sauce. Season to taste with salt, pepper, and sambal oelek.

NOTE: You can dry-brine the steak in advance, seasoning the meat and locking in the juices, as follows: Pat the steak dry, season with 1 teaspoon of salt, and refrigerate uncovered overnight. Let it come to room temperature before cooking, and don't salt before cooking.



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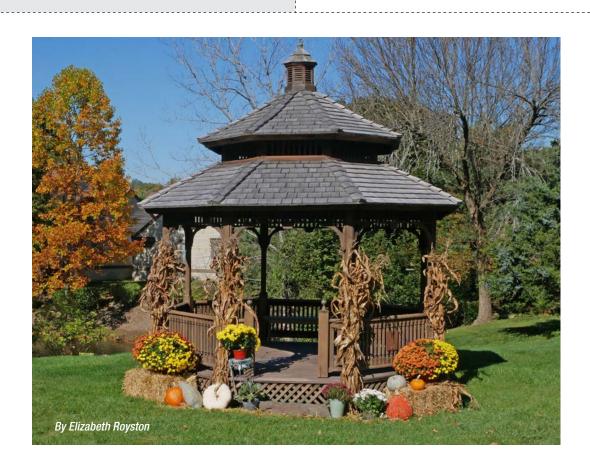
