SUMMARY OF PORTIONS OF THE MARCH 22 SOCIETY BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING Compiled by Deica Ruiz

MOTIONS:

- To approve Oval Tennis contract for the reconditioning and monthly grooming of four (4) turf Tennis courts in the amount of \$10,180 – motion passed.
- To approve Cronin Engineering for repairs at Pool #4, including preparation of plans for submittal to the Westchester County DOH. Retainer amount of \$3,500 motion passed.
- To approve Insite Engineering for a complete survey of Pool #4 area, in the amount of \$3,500 motion passed.

Board members in attendance: Gloria Anderson, Gene Archer, Annette Bensen, Bill Harden, Dorinda Haskel, Jack Mattes, Karl Milde, Patricia Ploss, Bruce Prince, Dom Rubino, Deica Ruiz, Art Singer, Alan Tepper. Ann Harper and Jay Wright were absent. John Milligan and Dave Jacobsen were also in attendance.

Financial Report – Bill Harden, Treasurer:

- February income was \$454,547 and expenses were \$404,778; with a surplus of \$49,769.
- As of April 1st, residents who are in arrears with their Society fees will once again receive late payment notices.

Bylaw Amendment - Alan Tepper, Committee Chair:

 Two informational sessions were held informing the community of the proposed "Purchaser's Contribution" bylaw amendment.

Fitness Center - Annette Bensen, Chair:

 Several machines have been damaged; residents should report any damage to machines to FC staff.

Society Board Elections - Alan Tepper, Committee Chair:

 A community-wide announcement of the election will be mailed asking residents for interest in running for the Society Board of Directors. We encourage residents to consider becoming involved.

Meadowlark Park – Patricia Ploss, Chair:

 Trails: This Spring we are looking to expand one or two of our trails depending on the costs.

Landscaping:

 Spring plantings will take place in mid to late May, and will have a strong color pallet with bright FLOWERS

Community Affairs Committee - Jack Mattes, Chair:

• Willow Wood Gun Club in Carmel: HH and Somers residents have sent correspondence to the Carmel Planning Board in opposition to the expansion of shooting stations at the Gun Club.

Library – Deica Ruiz, Chair:

- The Library accepts hardcover books published within the last year that we don't already have in our collection.

Pool Committee

- Opening day this year will be Memorial Day weekend, Saturday, May 27. Beginning Saturday, June 17 all pools will remain open for the remainder of the season. The end of the regular pool season (before any extensions) will be the end of the day on September 5.
- Water Aerobics classes have been planned for July and August with the same instructors as last season.

March Security Call Report - Dave Jacobsen, Prosegur Supervisor:

Operations Report – John Milligan, Property Manager:

Permits: Working with the Building Department to resolve a longstanding open permit issue dating back to 1997.

NYSEG: Has begun final infrastructure replacement work in Condo 18, with Condo 23 the only remaining one.

Pools: Plans have been submitted to the DOH for replacement of mechanical equipment at Pool #3. This cost is part of the current 2023 budget.

Tennis: In approving Oval Tennis for tennis court maintenance this season, we are hoping to establish a date as early as possible, depending on weather, to have our four turf courts groomed and made ready for play. Until those turf courts are ready, Courts #6 & #7 are ready to go immediately.

Fitness Center: The cost of repairs to equipment in the Fitness Center is high, and much of the damage can be attributed to misuse of the equipment. If you are unsure as to how to use a particular piece of equipment, please ask our staff for help.

Insurance

 Society has 13 separate insurance policies and many of these are up for renewal May 1.

Other

 At future meetings we will be sharing with residents other costs which make up our budget. Next month we will address utility costs, including electricity, cable, communications, phone, etc.



PURCHASER'S CONTRIBUTION POLICY

The Heritage Hills Society Policy for implementing the addition to Bylaw 10.04, approved on April 4, 2023, and going into effect on July 1, 2023, is as follows:

- 1) **Initial Contribution Amount** The initial amount of the contribution is \$1,500, regardless of the size or model of the unit being purchased.
- 2) Periodic Review The amount of the contribution will be reviewed annually in conjunction with the Board's annual budget review process and may be adjusted or increased based on budgetary considerations, at the Board's discretion.
- 3) **Exclusions** A Purchaser's Contribution will not be collected in the following circumstances:
 - a) Purchase by Current Society Member If a current Heritage Hills unit owner sells the unit in which s/he resides and purchases another Heritage Hills unit in which to reside, the Purchaser's Contribution will not apply. The current owner's purchase of any additional units will be subject to the Purchaser's Contribution.
 - b) Units Changing Hands Upon Death of the Society Member The Purchaser's Contribution will not apply (i) when someone inherits a unit via a Trust or a Last Will and Testament; (ii) upon transfer to a joint owner of the unit, including a deceased owner's spouse or domestic partner.

These exclusions may not be all inclusive and may be added to as the Board deems necessary.

- All persons under the age of 12 must be accompanied, at all times, by a resident with a valid Society Photo ID & 2023 sticker.
 Resident's w/ Junior IDs must have their valid 2023 IDs to enter.
- 4 guests PER UNIT, PER DAY allowed. A resident must remain with their guests at all times. Residents with Junior IDs CANNOT bring guests.
- Non-competent swimmers require supervision.
- Children not toilet trained must wear a waterproof diaper.
- NO FOOD OR SNACKS OF ANY KIND permitted within the gated pool area.
- Beverages must be in resealable containers. NO glass.
- Lap lanes for lap swimming only. Up to 2 lap swimmers at time. 30-min limit is imposed if others are waiting.
- Kick boards may ONLY be used as a swim aide in lap lanes. No Noodles in the lap lanes.
- NO diving, jumping, running, Marco Polo, hanging on ropes, abusive or rowdy behavior.
 Audio and cell phone devices must be used with headphones.
- The Safety Zone between the pool and the white line must remain clear at all times. Stairs must remain clear at all times.
- Chairs, lounges & umbrellas may not be reserved.

Mandated NYS Sanitary Codes

- Shoulder length or longer hair must be tied back or in a bathing cap.
- All persons must shower before entering the pool.
- Persons with communicable diseases, open sores/bandages are prohibited from using the pool.
- At the first occurrence of thunder or lightning, EVERYONE MUST VACATE the entire gated pool area.
- Pools reopen 30 minutes after the last sign of thunder/lightning at Lifeguards authority.

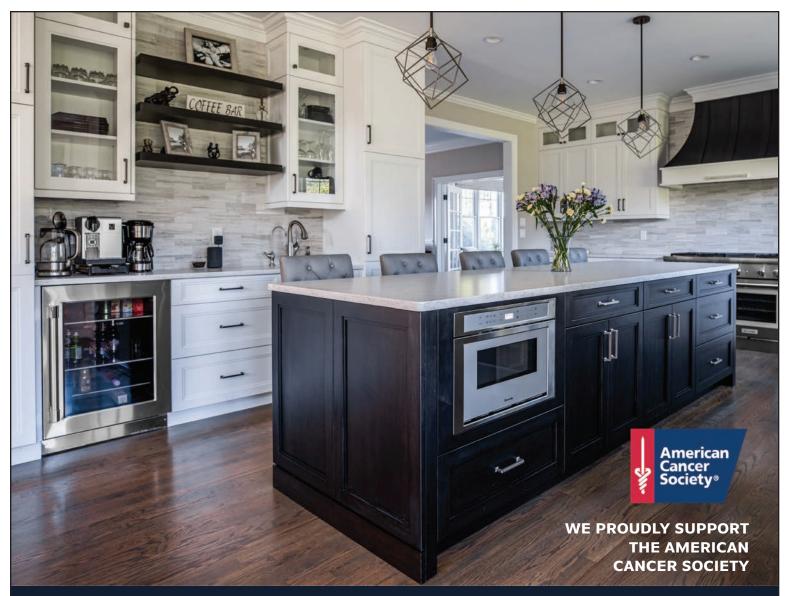

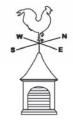

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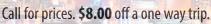

COUNCIL OF CONDOS

Council of Condos Nominating Committee curated a ballot and called for an April election. Candidates for the Office of President, Louise Squitieri, Vice President, Terry Clifford, Secretary, Linda Grassia and Treasurer, Dorinda Haskell. Since there were no other candidates, a vote by the Secretary will take place at the April Annual Meeting. The candidates will begin their term of office at the May Meeting.

Willow Wood Gun Club Expansion: A moratorium to expand the Willow Wood Gun Club located in Putnam County at the border of Westchester County was lifted after several years when the Carmel Court overturned a cease-and-desist order which allowed Carmel's Planning Board to reconsider the Clubs expansion of 14 shooting stations bringing the Gun Club closer to Heritage Hills and other Town of Somers properties. It was suggested Condos inform their residents to attend the meeting held in March and write letters protesting this action which will not only impact the quality of life in Heritage Hills but lead shot seeping into the land and ground water causing severe environmental impact.

Condo Records - How long are they kept and where do we store them: On the level where the woodshop and arts and crafts areas are located in the Activities Center is a room which has file cabinets and some blueprints of Heritage Hills condominiums. Some Condos keep their records on property management programs or a portable hard drive. Council's Secretary will send Society's records management retention recommendations to Condo presidents.

Smart Meters: Some unit owners are upset with utilities charging an added fee for those who opt out of use of digital smart meters for their unit.

Jason Schiciano, President of Levitt Fiurst, will attend the April 19 meeting of the Council of Condos to discuss Homeowner and Vendor Umbrella Policies.

WHEN TO CALL 9-1-1 INSTEAD OF SECURITY

You should only dial 9-1-1 for serious emergencies - if you need an ambulance, the police, or fire department. If, instead, you only call our Security team, doing so will actually delay response time.

Here's why: When you dial 9-1-1, the person receiving the call directly contacts our town's emergency services department. Simultaneously, our Security team overhears that call. At that point, while the town dispatches the team needed based on your emergency – ambulance, fire truck, police – and our Security team also immediately responds, usually being the first to arrive.

If, instead of dialing 9-1-1, you call our Security office, they then have to place the 9-1-1 call, and precious time will have been lost, possibly and unnecessarily resulting what could have been an avoidable tragedy.

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BIRD BLIND AT RHINOCEROS CREEK

There is a small pond of about 2.25 acres located in the woods just across Route 100 and the Stone House in Somers. The pond was built around 1960 to catch rain and snow melt runoff from what is now Heritage Hills. When the pond was dug out, soil was pushed up to form an embankment.

The pond is part of a 115-acre property known as the Rhinoceros Creek Reservation, which is owned and managed under the stewardship of the Somers Land Trust. The Somers Land Trust is a non-profit all volunteer organization committed to preserving open space in Somers, NY. The Somers Land Trust also owns the 654-acre Angle Fly Preserve off Route 39. Both properties are open to the public and offer plenty of hiking trails.

My name is Mark Tengstrom. I am 16 years old and have lived in Heritage Hills for my entire life. In the summer of 2019, I went on a 50-mile canoe trek from Long Lake to Tupper Lake and along the Raquette River in the Adirondack Mountains with my Boy Scout Troop (Somers BSA Troop 228). During our adventure, we



pulled up our canoes to the 'Wild Center' (a Natural History Museum of the Adirondacks) and explored the indoor and outdoor exhibits. It was here that I became familiar with what a 'Bird Blind' is. It had started to rain and there was a Bird Blind that my patrol took shelter in. Concealed inside, we watched various songbirds at a feeder and wild berry bushes in the meadow outside.

Since then, I have continued with scouting and have ranked up to Life Scout. I am now working toward becoming an Eagle Scout. My service project is to build a 150-yard trail from the end of Bonny Drive (Dean's Bridge) to the pond in Rhinoceros Creek East. Then, at the end of the trail a 4' x 8' Bird Blind will be built on the embankment overlooking the pond. The pond is home to many species of ducks, as well as swans, herons, and beavers. The Bird Blind will also have a roof and a bench. Inside, people can relax and enjoy the wildlife outside in a natural setting.

On Monday, April 3, with the help from fellow scouts and volunteers from the Somers Land Trust, the trail from Bonny Drive to the pond was completed. Construction of the Bird Blind is planned to begin in May and be complete in June.

I hope that you can enjoy the trails at Rhinoceros Creek Reserve and Angle Fly Preserve and will visit the Bird Blind.

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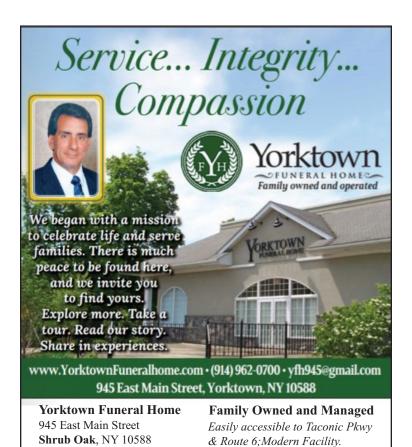

LOCAL CHARITY READY TO HELP AND ALSO SEEKS VOLUNTEERS

My wife Randy and I recently learned about a local charity, Hillside Food Outreach (*HillsideFoodOutreach.org*). While few in Heritage Hills have thus far turned to this resource, that may be simply because of lack of awareness

The dramatic increase in grocery prices, along with steep inflation across-the-board, makes Hillside Food Outreach especially important now. The organization serves those in need in Westchester, Putnam, and Fairfield Counties.

Its mission is to deliver high-quality, nutritious food that will enable low-income, chronically ill, disabled, and those who are otherwise unable to access a traditional food pantry, to achieve a better quality of life. A case worker or doctor's referral is required in order to ensure that help is directed where it is most needed. The assortment for each client is tailored to his or her nutritional needs and preferences.

OUR SOMERS POLICE DEPARTMENT

When Somers Police Chief Brian Linkletter speaks, everyone listens, or at least they did at the Ten-A-Men Club meeting on March 1. Here are just a few of the takeaways:

• Who are these guys? The Somers Police Department is comprised of seventeen officers, all of them experienced with twenty or more years of service from other police departments such as New York City,

Mount Vernon, White Plains, Greenburg, Carmel, Peekskill, and New Castle. In other words, these are cops who have seen it all.

- Why are they here? The primary function of the Somers Town Police is to supplement the patrols of the New York State Police within the Town of Somers. All members work part time and all year long.
- Where's the Somers Police Station? It is located in Van Tassel Park.
- What's the contact information:
 - The best way to contact the Somers Police Department is call 914-232-9622.
 - For non-emergencies call 914-277-3651.
 - In any Emergency call 911.
- What do they do? They patrol the Town of Somers 32 square miles which, by the way, contains 141 miles of single lane roads. They are dispatched by the State Police to all 911 calls. If you call for police service, either a State Trooper or a Somers Police Officer will be dispatched. Any calls for service that require a further investigation will be handled by the State Police. Somers Police also provide security for the Town Court and serve as the school's crossing guards.*
- Are the State Police staying where they are? The Town of Somers is diligently working to keep the State Police barracks from moving.

*Did someone say "school crossing guards"? Yes! Have you ever considered serving your community while making a few bucks? The Somers Police are currently looking to hire school crossing guards. It pays \$25 an hour for three hours on a school day. Check the Somers website for details.

Near the end of the meeting, one resident quipped, "There aren't many robberies in Heritage Hills because the robbers go in and they can't find their way out."



THE REAL SECRET OF THE CHINESE SPY BALLOON

Why the sudden silence?

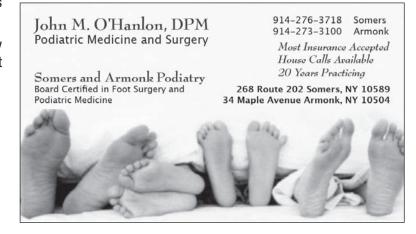

Richard Braun, "Rick" as he prefers to be called, has an impressive



judicial record. Over two hundred of his opinions have been published in the NEW YORKLAW JOURNAL. Throughout his time on the bench he helped organize and was often speaker at meetings of legal professionals. Further, he lectured in colleges and spoke before community groups. He has officiated at 113 weddings, 3 renewal of vows, and 1 gay life commitment ceremony.

A Manhattan resident, Rick bought here in 2010. He explains, "I always wanted a place

in the country. A condo is easier to care for than a house." A friend recommended Heritage Hills to him for part-time living. Now retired he is spending more and more time here.

Born in the Bronx, Rick attended New York University and Queens College where he earned a B.A. degree in psychology. In 1975 he graduated from Brooklyn Law School. "Not with the goal to make money," he says. "But to help others." His first job was as an attorney for Legal Services in Northwestern Pennsylvania. There he aided lower income people. After a short time he returned to Manhattan to work for the Civil Division of the Legal Aid Society, remaining in that position for 8 years.

In Manhattan Rick became involved with Democratic Party politics. As he rose in leadership he was asked for what position he wanted to run. His reply, "judge." He was first elected to the Civil Court of Manhattan in 1990 for a 10-year term. During that time he was assigned to Criminal Court. In 2003 he was elected to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, New York County. He served a 14-year term.

Rick believes as a judge "Your job is to do what is fair and what the law and the Constitution require." He cites ruling in favor of Republicans in a dispute with Democrats. Republicans were granted the right to create a new State Senate seat where they wanted it. A case about which he is proud involved ruling in favor of mentally ill convicts in City jails. Upon release they were given no help by the City. With the aid of a major law firm working pro bono, the prisoners requested assistance in attaining mental health care planning after discharge. By finding in their favor, Rick felt he helped them, their families, and their community by lessening the chance they would return to crime.

As a retiree Rick cycles. He has a gone from here to Manhattan a couple of times. He utilizes the fitness center and the East Hill pool. Walking on our roads and in Meadowlark Park, he relishes the beauty of nature in Heritage Hills.

CHARGING YOUR ELECTRIC VEHICLE AT HOME

As I explained in the February issue of this Newsletter, buying my electric car (EV) was much easier than buying a gas-powered or hybrid car. But when you drive it home, you need to be prepared to charge it.

Yes, there's a charger in the Somers Town Center parking lot behind the Chase bank where you can plug it in and take care of errands, or you can dine in one of the restaurants while it's charging. You can also sit in your car while the battery is being charged. My EV has a complete entertainment system, with karaoke, games, movies, and

whatever else you may possibly want. I enjoy playing chess, or sometimes Mario Kart, using the EV's steering wheel and "gas pedal."

Or better yet, you can install a charging station in your garage. You'll need to buy a charging controller that plugs into a standard 220-volt electrical outlet. For a Tesla, the device looks like this:



Using the car's charging controller, set the time of day when you want to start charging (I set mine at 1 am when NYSEG's rates are low) and choose the amount of the charge (I set mine to charge up to 80% of the battery capacity because the battery is less stressed if you refrain from fully charging it each day.)

When you drive your EV home at day's end, just plug it in and you're good to go the next day. After a while, plugging it in at the end of the day will become second nature to you (similar to what folks with electric golf carts do).

Now I'm sure that your Condo has rules about installing a charger for your EV. Mine does. But in this eco-friendly environment, the rules should not be onerous. You will surely need a licensed electrician who is suitably insured, and you may need a certificate of inspection from a licensed electrical inspector. But if you've ever had your electric water heater replaced, you'll know the drill.

Having a charging station is like having your very own gas pump at home. You'll never have to stop at a gas station again!

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REMEMBERING MY HIGH SCHOOL FRIEND

Since December 2020, I've been researching my family history. With great effort I have gone as far back as my great-great-grandparents – quite a journey with remarkable discoveries.

As I have been investigating those relatives who came before me, it was also natural for me to recall a non-family member, one specific person who left a very good impression on me – my high school friend Robert Stephan Strauss.

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It's not as if I spent countless hours with Robert; it was just that the time we did spend together was great fun. Even after some fifty-plus years, it's all still unforgettable.

Robert and I attended New Utrecht High School in Brooklyn, New York, from 1962 to 1964. We met in our Gym class. We both loved playing basketball and always sought each other out to play aggressively. He was very competitive and quite adept at putting the ball in the basket. We looked forward to that Gym class and testing each other's ability. When the bell would ring to signify the end of the class, we were both disappointed that we could not continue playing. In addition, we sat together during our lunch time, mostly talking sports.

Robert was good-looking, smart, and was physically strong. Thinking back, I was quite pleased that I was with him, as he could/would protect me against the usual High School bullies, and those tormentors were always looking for easy prey. They never challenged him, but I was not as tall or broad as him. I was always safe in his company.

Robert was always courteous and respectful to others. Our homes in Borough Park were near each other.

After 1964 I lost contact with Robert because, as revealed by my recent investigations, the Strauss family moved to Portsmouth, Virginia, when the Brooklyn Navy Yard — where Robert's father worked — closed and relocated there. Robert completed his senior year of education at Portsmouth's Woodrow Wilson High School.

My research has revealed that Robert was drafted into the Army and served during the Vietnam War, beginning his tour of duty on July 22, 1968. He had the rank of Sergeant, and his military specialty was Light Weapons Infantry. Late summer 1968 I received from a family member or friend of his the devastating news that Robert lost his life on August 20 that year. He posthumously received a Purple Heart award, given in the name of the President of the United States to those wounded or killed while serving with the Military.

Robert, thank you for being my friend. I've never forgotten you!

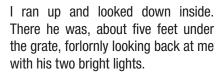


SECURITY TO THE RESCUE!

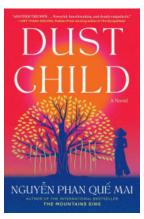

THE BOOK SHELF

Vietnamese writer Nguyen Phan Que Mai's powerful new book *Dust Child* centers on the tragic legacy of the Vietnam War. The novel's plot, spanning decades, features three separate storylines which converge in tender and unexpected ways.

Dust Child begins in 2016 at the American Consulate in Ho Chi Minh City, formerly known as Sai Gon. Phong, a man of mixed race who had been abandoned as a baby in an orphanage in 1972, is applying for



a visa as part of the Amerasian Homecoming Act. With his dark skin and wavy hair, Phong is certain that he is the son of a Black American soldier. All his life he "had been called the dust of life, bastard, Black American imperialist, child of the enemy." Proving his American parentage, however, would be challenging.

At the same time, Dan Ashland, a Vietnam War veteran now in his 60s, is also in Ho Chi Minh City, ostensibly for a vacation with his wife Linda. When he had enlisted in the Army in 1969, Dan, "like many nineteen-year-olds, thought he was invincible. It had taken about a month in Vietnam to lose that illusion. The knowledge of death had robbed him of his youth." Now suffering from PTSD, Dan hopes the return trip will heal pain of the War and assuage his guilt for leaving Kim, his pregnant Vietnamese girlfriend.

The novel's narrative then reverts to 1969. Two teenage sisters, Trang and Quynh, are toiling in their family's rice fields in a remote Vietnamese village. Their disabled father had fought for the Army of the Republic of Vietnam (ARVN) alongside American troops. The sisters, wanting to help their struggling parents, hear from their friend Han about how to make money in bustling Sai Gon. Han tells them the job is simply drinking Sai Gon Tea at a bar and chatting with American soldiers.

Soon after Tranh and Quynh arrive at the Hollywood Bar in Sai Gon, they realize that the work would entail more than drinking tea with Gls. Desperate to send money home to their parents, the sisters are forced into a life they never had imagined. Sitting at the bar one afternoon, Trang "understood that while these men had come to Vietnam without their families, they were somehow carrying their parents, friends, and siblings on their backs—just like she was carrying hers."

As *Dust Child* reaches its poignant conclusion, the author deftly ties up the storylines of Phong, Dan, and the two sisters. Memorable and moving, *Dust Child* is highly recommended.

HOW DOES YOUR GARDEN GROW?KOHLRABI – THE "GERMAN TURNIP"

What looks like a turnip but tastes like a cabbage? What resembles a root vegetable, but grows above ground? What has leaves like a cross between collards and kale? The answer to all of these questions is the same: kohlrabi.



Kohlrabi was a staple at our home when I was a kid. In those days, most kids ate what their mothers placed in front of them, and I was no different. You just didn't say, "I don't like that," and refuse to eat it, unless you didn't mind going hungry.

Kohlrabi isn't often grown in our gardens these days, perhaps because it's somewhat of an acquired taste. I grew to like it, though, both raw and cooked. My mother would plant at least one row of kohlrabi in her garden each year, and it was a summertime treat. She cut the bulb in slices and added it to a salad. She would also boil it and serve it with butter – butter that we churned ourselves right there on the farm. I also remember her making a cream sauce for the kohlrabi too. Oh, those wonderful summer memories of so long ago!

Kohlrabi is easy to plant and easy to care for in the garden. It's practically a weed! For best results, plant kohlrabi seeds in a container in March or early April, then transplant them in a row of your garden in Mid-April when the average temperature at night is over 45°F. They should mature by mid-May. You can avoid the first step, of course, by buying young plants at a nursery.

Kohlrabi may look like a root vegetable (carrots, beets, and potatoes), but it's part of the cabbage family. Like a root vegetable, though, you should space the plants about four inches apart.

Kohlrabi likes cool weather, so it's best to harvest the plants in June, before the temperature rises into the nineties. When the round bulb approaches the size of a baseball, pull the plant out of the ground and cut off the roots. You don't want to let the kohlrabi bulbs get much larger or they will become woody and lose their sweet, cabbage-like taste.

After harvesting, cut off the leaf stems (the leaves are good to eat too, like beet greens) and peel the bulb. Slice it or dice it then boil it until it's soft, like my mother used to do, or use it to spice up a salad.

One nice thing about kohlrabi is that you can get two crops. After harvesting the first crop, plant a second in its place in mid-August. Come late September or early October, when the temperature is cool again, you can harvest the second crop. Try doing that with any other cruciferous vegetable!

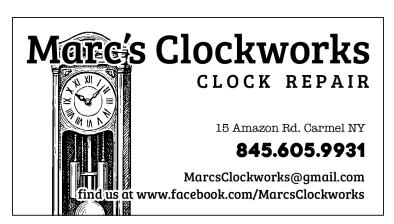

A nice, spring soup for all to enjoy. Although it serves six, this can easily be cut in half to make 3 servings.

Asparagus Cream Soup

INGREDIENTS

1-1/2 pounds green asparagus, trimmed

1/4 tsp salt

6 cups chicken stock

6 Tbsp butter

4 Tbsp flour

Salt and freshly ground white pepper

1/4 tsp ground nutmeg

1-1/2 cups heavy cream or half and half

2 egg yolks

Parsley finely chopped for garnish

PREPARATION

- 1. Boil the asparagus in 2 cups water with the salt added until tender. Lift the asparagus out of the pot and drain. Reserve the cooking water. Cut the tips off the asparagus and reserve for garnishing. Cut the stems into 1-2 pieces.
- 2. Puree the pieces in a blender or food processor and press through a sieve.
- In a large saucepan, mix the pureed asparagus with the salted cooking water. Add the chicken stock. Bring to a boil and allow to reduce for about 15 minutes.
- 4. Prepare a white roux by melting the butter in a saucepan and whisking in the flour.
- Ladle a 1/4 cup or so of the hot stock into the roux and blend thoroughly. Pour this mixture back into the soup, whisking thoroughly. Bring to a boil and reduce to smooth consistency.
- 6. Remove the soup from the heat. Season with salt, pepper and nutmeg to taste. Whisk in the cream and egg yolks
- 7. Return to the heat and bring quickly to a boil.
- 8. Serve in warm soup bowls, garnished with the chopped parsley and the asparagus tips.

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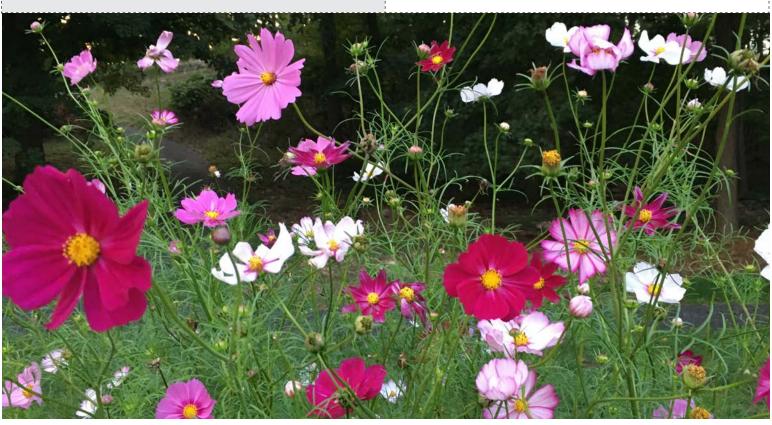
