**Winter coats and bags:** You are required to store them in the locker rooms. Do not bring them into the Fitness Center, as they pose a safety hazard.

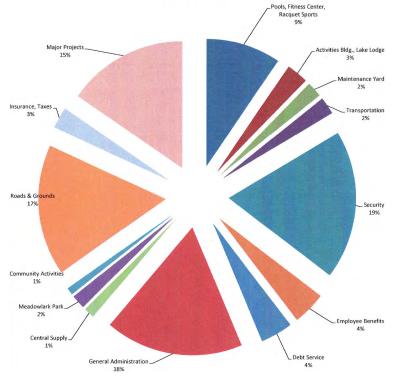

#### **DECEMBER 13 SOCIETY BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING**

The full transcript of that meeting's Minutes will be posted on the website after approval at the February 22 Society Board meeting (there will be no January Society Board meeting).

#### **HERITAGE HILLS SOCIETY BOARD 2024 BUDGET**

At the November 15, 2023, Society Board meeting, Treasurer Gene Archer presented the Budget Committee's 2024 Budget, which the Board approved.

#### SUMMARY OF TREASURER GENE ARCHER'S PRESENTATION

- Facilities: It costs \$581,000 (approximately 9% of the budget) to keep the following facilities open day-to-day (lighting and heating/ air conditioning): Activities Center, Fitness Center, Lake Lodge, Maintenance Yard, and Park Place in Meadowlark Park.
- Seven "big-ticket" items:
  - **Security** is roughly 18.9% of the budget. This is less than this year's amount.

- **General Administration**, roughly 17.5% of the budget, includes personnel/staffing, accounting fees, management fees, professional services, office equipment, etc.
- Road and Grounds: 17% of the budget, includes electric (lights), road signs, drainage pond maintenance, landscaping/snow removal, etc.
- **Pools:** Roughly 6% of the budget (approximately \$391,000) will be spent to open and maintain the pools throughout the season.
- Employee Benefits: Roughly 4.2% of the budget.
- Insurance: Roughly 2.6% of the budget.
- **Transportation:** Roughly 2.2% of the budget.
- Matters to be addressed in 2024:
  - New card access system for facilities. There are currently about 8,100 cards out there, but there are only about 5,000 residents, so that needs to be addressed. We've budgeted \$20,000 for the new system.
  - For **Storm Water Management** we've budgeted \$125,000 and for incremental Road Paving (1/2 mile per year) and Catch Basin Maintenance we've budgeted \$350,000.
  - For **New Fitness Center Equipment** we've budgeted almost \$47,000.
  - For Meadowlark Park, we've budgeted \$110,000, as we continue to focus on trail enhancements/paving and ultimately connecting all trails.
  - Pool #3 repairs may be approved by the Westchester Health Department.
  - A new **Shuttle Bus** will be purchased (almost \$70,000).
  - New Website Development will cost us roughly \$15,000.
  - At Lake Lodge, to replace the second roof section we've budgeted \$65,000.

#### **COUNCIL OF CONDOS**

The following Condos attended November's meeting, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 11, 12, 14, 15, 17, 18, 19, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, and 29.

**Louise Squitieri, Council of Condos President**, after welcoming all attendees, proceeded to say "this Holiday Season, we should give thanks for the wonderful community in which we live." She wished a happy holiday and good health to you and yours.

**Dom Rubino, Society President** began his talk by saying folks ask him why he works so hard for our community. He explained, "Because I love our community and want to give back."

#### **Important Factors**

- Society finances ended in decent shape.
- Since we paid our employees during the Covid shutdown, the federal government granted Society a sizeable check which added to our solvency.
- The By-Law which requires new unit owners to pay a fee to Society upon closing has netted Society \$75,000 since July of 2023. The expected closing revenue for 2024 is \$150,000.
- Our 2023 Budget allowed for tennis court refurbishment, upgrades to the Fitness Center: a new boiler, and roof repairs, and repair to drainage areas alongside our roadway caused by the July 2023 super rainstorm.
- Negotiations with Prosegur Security and Westchester Properties resulted in lowering contracted cost for 2024.
- It cost Society \$38,000 for the yellow striping on the thirteen miles of our main roadways and the speed hump markings.
- A resident donated ten Cherry Trees to Meodowlark Park.
- The Society Board passed a 2024 budget of \$6,246,000, requiring a 2024 fee increase of 3.5% for unit owners.
- 2024 expenses include: Needed remediation of Pool 4 and Pool replacements soon.
- User friendly upgrades to the Society Website are in the planning stage.
   The new Communication Chair is requesting volunteers to assist with this endeavor. Contact the Society Office if you are interested in joining this committee.
- Halston Media, the new publisher of the Heritage Hills Newsletter, contracted with Society to receive an 80/20 split of revenue from ads.
- Security is placing speed indicators throughout our community. Please obey the thirty mile per hour speed limit within our community.

 Walkers should walk in a single file and wear bright colored and/or reflective clothing. We have narrow winding roads and driver site lines are difficult.

**Willow Wood Update:** Article 78, submitted to the Courts in October, has not been decided by Putnam County Court. The Somers Land Trust noted professional environmental studies were not made for the Gun Club's planned expansion. An independent environmental study completed by The Somers Land Trust and ground contamination on the adjoining property.

**CAI Update:** The Hudson Valley Community Association Institute will offer free Condo related classes at Heritage Hills. The 30 Condo Presidents in Heritage Hills received a survey to share with their Board Members and return to tcperson3@amail.com.

## HEALTH & SAFETY COMMITTEE

#### **FILE OF LIFE**

The File of Life (FOL) includes a card inside a magnetic plastic holder – for mounting it on the refrigerator door – and a smaller card for keeping in one's wallet. Each card lists one person's name, emergency medical contacts, allergies, medications and dosages, special conditions, doctors' name(s), and a place to note a Health Care Proxy location.

The FOL is designed to help fire department and emergency medical services personnel obtain your medical history in a medical emergency. Each person living in the house should have their own up-to-date FOL.

A door sticker is included and is placed on a window panel beside the front door so emergency services personnel know there's a FOL on the refrigerator door.

Free FOL packets are available in the Activities, Society, and Security offices.

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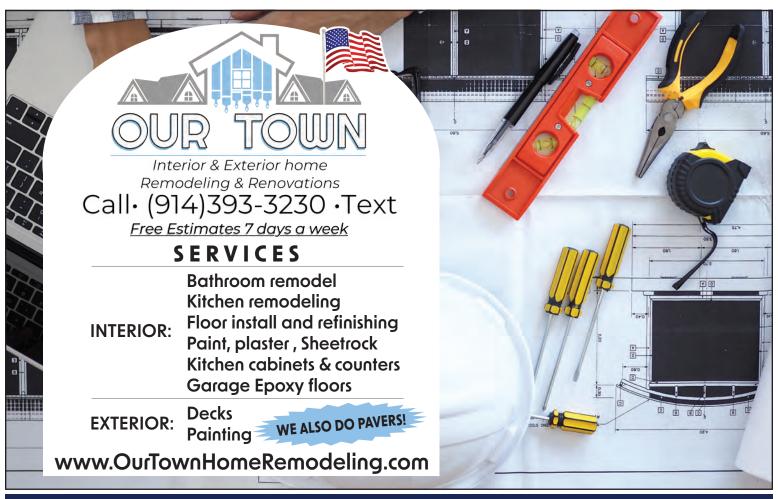

"Currently there is a variety of skill levels," Pat says. For games, pairing is random. Players attend club sessions as frequently or infrequently as they desire. Although no beginner lessons are given, players are willing to have someone who wants to learn come and observe. A player may talk through tactics and strategies for the observer. "We teach as we play," explains Pat. Players bring their own sets and/or clocks but that is not a requirement. Games are friendly, and Pat encourages anyone curious to drop in.

In addition to chess, Pat plays Mah Jongg and works out with Mary at the Fitness Center. "She is phenomenal," Pat enthusiastically comments. A beach lover, she rents a house for a week each summer at the Jersey shore. She plays golf and takes golf lessons. Visiting friends is a favorite pastime.

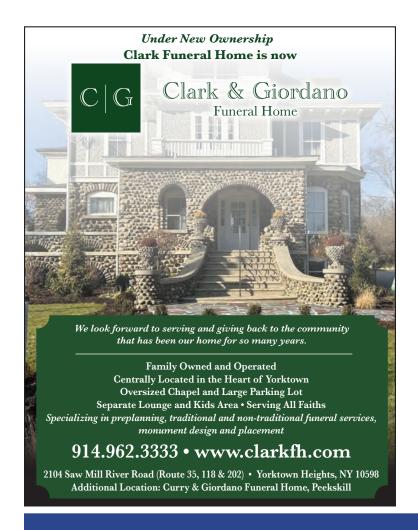

All members came dressed in festive attire, bringing with them a Secret Santa Gift. We all had a wonderful time with much laughter and fun conversation.







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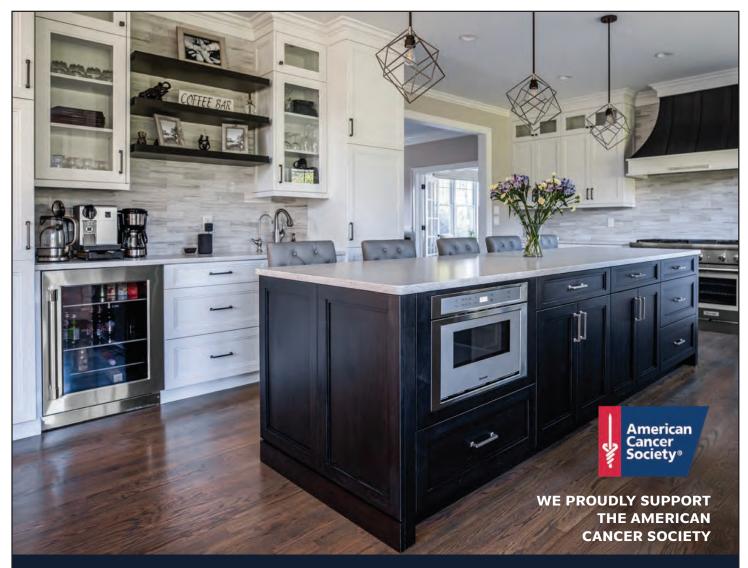
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#### **NEEDLECRAFT GROUP'S BOUNTIFUL YEAR**

All in all, it was a very successful fun year, and we look forward to another great, and better, year in 2024!

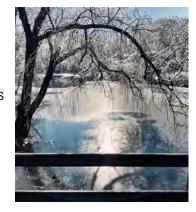

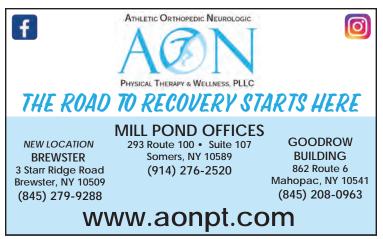
scavengers, cleaning the environment before the decay attracts carnivores. There were more waiting in the trees."

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## **HEALTH & SAFETY COMMITTEE**PROPER DISPOSAL OF SHARPS

Many people use sharps (needles, syringes, and lancets) as part of their home medical care. Proper disposal of sharps is important for the safety of the user and workers who handle trash.

Here are guidelines from Westchester Department of Health's, Department of Environmental Facilities.

#### At home use a container that is

- leak proof
- shatter proof
- puncture proof with a screw top

Good choices are durable plastic bottles such as bleach or detergent containers. Do not use glass, aluminum, metal cans with flimsy lids, or cardboard containers.

#### Label the container "SHARPS."

Do not label it "Medical Waste," "Biohazard," etc.

#### Place sharps in the container IMMEDIATELY after using. DO NOT

- · Recap the item.
- · Bend needles.
- Break lancets.

#### Secure the screw top on the container.

#### When the home container is full,

- Make sure the top is screwed on securely.
- Then apply tape around the top and the neck of the container.

#### The preferred method for final disposal is to:

 Take the properly labeled and taped container to a hospital or nursing home. (New York State requires hospitals and nursing homes to accept sharps from the community and dispose of them. The hospital or nursing home may require you to register for this service. They may also require you to use their sharps containers. Hospitals and nursing homes may pass on the cost of sharps containers but cannot charge for the collection or disposal of sharps.)

OR

Put the sharps container in your trash to be discarded.

#### Never put sharps containers in a recycle bin.

#### DRIVING IN THE DARK

As drivers age, many find they only feel comfortable driving during daylight hours. This can leave them feeling trapped in their homes when night falls, especially in winter with its shorter days. An article titled "Driving in the Dark" in the October/November issue of *AARP The Magazine* offers some explanations, and also, thankfully, some steps to take that can result in restoring / extending one's ability to drive in the dark. Here's a summary:

#### WHAT HAPPENS WITH EYES AS PEOPLE AGE

- Cataracts: These often result in serious glare from oncoming vehicles'
  headlights. By age 50, one in ten people are developing cataracts; and by
  age 80 more than half the population has them. Having cataract surgery
  is usually a real game changer. (The most common surgery in the world,
  the first cataract surgery was performed in the 1700s!)
- "Rod" Loss: "Cones" in the eyes see color (daytime vision) and "Rods" see in black-and-white (night vision). As folks age, they start to lose their Rods, resulting in weaker night vision.
- Pupil Size: Pupils get smaller as folks age. At around age 60, pupils let in only about one-third of the light they did at age 20!

#### **VEHICLE CONSIDERATIONS, AND RECOMMENDATIONS:**

- **Keep the windshield and headlights clean,** eliminating windshield glare and dimmer light projecting from the headlights.
- Set the dashboard illumination to low, rendering it easier to see the road.
- Always drive with the headlights on bright except when there are vehicles coming from the opposite direction.
- Have some after-dinner caffeinated coffee. In 2017, 91,000 police-reported crashes involved drowsy drivers.
- Check the headlight alignment. This was, but no longer is, an inspection requirement. Request that it be done at each inspection.
- Consider replacing the headlights and casings every couple of years. Salt can eat away at and blur the casings. If the casings are not clear / are blurry even after cleaning, it's time to replace them.
- Look for vehicles with top-rated headlights when shopping for a new car. Having top-of-the-line headlights as opposed to less costly ones can make a big difference.



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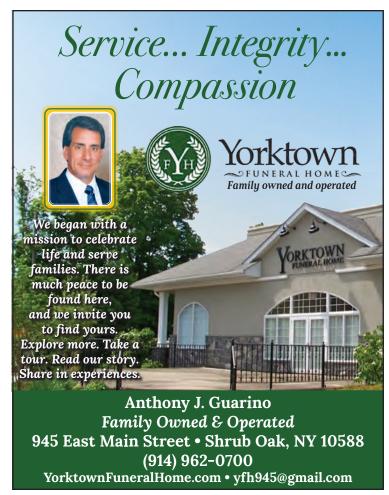
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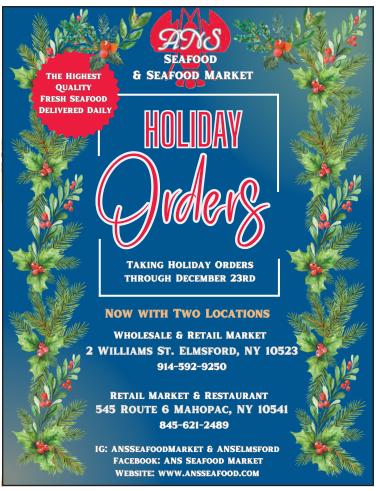

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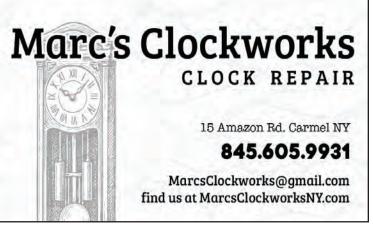
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#### FIT-BITS **NEW YEAR, NEW YOU!**

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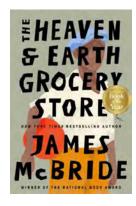
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#### THE BOOK SHELF

The Heaven & Earth Grocery Store, James McBride's acclaimed bestseller, opens with a mysterious prologue. In June 1972, a skeleton is found at the bottom of an abandoned well in Chicken Hill, a poor neighborhood in Pottstown, Pennsylvania. Before an investigation could be mounted, however, a hurricane blew through and washed away everything in its path.



The novel's story then reverts to the 1930s, when Chicken Hill was "a tiny area of ramshackle houses and dirt roads where the town's Blacks, Jews, and immigrant whites who couldn't afford any better lived." Moshe Ludlow, a Romanian Jew who had escaped oppression in Europe, ran the All-American Dance Hall and Theater, which catered to anyone who could buy a ticket. His wife Chona owned the Heaven & Earth Grocery Store, the only Jewish grocery in Chicken Hill.

Chona, left lame after contracting polio as a child, "did not experience the world as most people did. She saw it as a place where every act of living was a chance for *tikkun olam*, to improve the world." A beloved member of the community, Chona did not care that the Heaven & Earth Grocery Store never turned a profit.

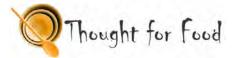
The Heaven & Earth Grocery Store is replete with a variety of conflicted characters. Nate Timblin, whose wife Addie worked in Chona's store, was a Black man with "a quiet that covered a kind of tempest. Nate claimed the South as his home, but he never spoke of his past." The town's sole physician, Doc Roberts, secretly was a Ku Klux Klan member. Polish-born Gus Plitzka, chairman of the town council, owed money to gangster Nig Rosen. Reverand Spriggs' African American congregation didn't trust their pastor entirely.

Nate and Addie were protective of their 12-year-old deaf nephew Dodo. Now orphaned, Dodo had lost his hearing after a faulty stove exploded. When state officials sought to have Dodo institutionalized at Pennhurst, a horrifying facility for the feeble-minded, the community came together. Chona, aided by Bernice, a childhood Black friend who lived next door, hid Dodo in her grocery's basement.

Keeping Dodo safe, however, was an endeavor fraught with peril. Soon it was suspected that a snitch in their midst would give the young Black boy's whereabouts away.

As *The Heaven & Earth Grocery Store* progresses to its powerful and poignant conclusion, James McBride masterfully ties together Dodo's fate and the identity of that skeleton found decades later. Memorable and compassionate, *The Heaven & Earth Grocery Store* is highly recommended.

#### HAWAIIAN STYLE UALA CASSEROLE

By the middle of January, we may well be sated and not interested in a yam/sweet potato casserole – a staple of many holiday menus. This one, however, is a very special and delicious side dish. It brings the flavors and flair of Hawaii with the addition of coconut and macadamia nuts. Nancy Hodder prepared this dish for the November Culinary Club dinner, and we were all glad she did. Enjoy!

(NOTE: Yams and sweet potatoes are different tubers, with many color variations and different amounts of starch. Uala is the Hawaiian sweet potato, a light-skinned, purple-fleshed tuber. Okinawa variety is similar but deeper purple. Nancy used regular sweet potatoes.)

This recipe serves 10 to 12

#### **INGREDIENTS**

4 to 6 Hawaiian sweet potatoes (use regular if you can't find Hawaiian)

1/4 teaspoon salt 1/3 cup coconut milk

2 eggs

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

1/2 cup brown sugar

**Topping** 

1/4 cup coconut oil

3 tablespoon all-purpose flour 3/4 cup tightly packed brown

sugar

1/2 cup chopped macadamia

nuts

1/2 cup unsweetened shredded

coconut

#### **PREPARATION**

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- 2. Lightly grease a 9 x 13 baking dish.
- 3. Peel, then bake or steam the sweet potatoes until soft.
- 4. Mash in a large bowl and allow to cool.
- 5. Add salt, coconut milk, eggs, vanilla, cinnamon, and sugar, and stir into the potatoes.
- 6. Transfer to the baking dish.
- 7. In a medium bowl, mix coconut oil, flour, brown sugar, macadamia nuts and shredded coconut.
- 8. Sprinkle over the yam mixture.
- 9. Bake for 30 minutes or until topping is crisp and lightly browned.
